Speakers

Professor Dom Geraghty (North)

Pro Vice-Chancellor (Launceston), University of Tasmania



Professor Dom Geraghty is the University of Tasmania's inaugural Pro Vice-Chancellor (Launceston), driving delivery of the University's Northern Transformation vision and strategic objectives for the city and region.

Originally from Ireland, Dom is deeply connected with the University and Launceston, having researched and taught there for almost three decades. He started lecturing at the Newnham campus in 1991, just six weeks after the Tasmanian State Institute of Technology amalgamated with the University.

Dom is a highly regarded and widely published pharmacologist and a passionate science communicator. He has presented public lectures on health awareness and been a 'guest scientist' on radio. The first in his family to attend university, Dom is passionate about growing the University's presence and increasing educational access and attainment and is excited to engage with the Northern Tasmanian community in this new capacity.

Lee Whiteley (North-West)

Chief Executive of the University College, University of Tasmania

Lee Whiteley is the Chief Executive of the University College Division of the University of Tasmania. He is leading the drive for the University College to be a competitive, world-class education provider with a focus on creating new opportunities for Tasmanian communities and industries, especially those who have not engaged previously with higher education.

Lee has held high level management and leadership positions in the Advanced Manufacturing sector. He has been Executive General Manager at Elphinstone Pty Ltd, Managing Director (and Founder) of Southern Prospect Pty Ltd, and Vice President of Vestas Nacelles Denmark (the world's largest wind turbine company).

Lee has been invited to sit on government committees including the Tasmanian Government's Caterpillar Transition Task Force, the Premier's Business Advisory Council and the Tasmanian Economic Development Regional Reference Group. In these roles he has advocated strongly for the manufacturing industry and regional communities, resulting in a transition in Tasmania of regional skilled workforces from traditional to advanced manufacturing.

Lee graduated from TAFE as an automotive electrician in North-West Tasmania more than 30 years ago and he didn't step foot in a University until he was 37 years old. Now one of the most respected industry figures in Tasmania, his own life story drives his mission to improve educational and employment opportunities and outcomes.



Professor Rufus Black (South)

Vice-Chancellor, University of Tasmania



Professor Rufus Black is the Vice-Chancellor and President of the University of Tasmania. Previously, he was Master of Melbourne University's Ormond College and an Enterprise Professor in the Department of Management and Marketing and a Principal Fellow in the Department of Philosophy at the University of Melbourne.

Rufus' private sector experience includes nine years as a partner at McKinsey and Company, serving clients in Australia and Asia, and as a Director for national law firm Corrs Chambers Westgarth. His educational and social sector experience includes being the President of

Museums Victoria, the Deputy Chancellor of Victoria University, the founding Chair of the Teach for Australia Board, a Director of the New York based Teach for All and a Director of the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research. He has worked extensively for government at Federal and State levels.

He was a Board Member of Innovation Science Australia, conducted the Black Review into the Department of Defence and the Prime Minister's Independent Review of the Australian Intelligence Community and was the Strategic Advisor to the Secretary of Education in Victoria. Rufus holds degrees in law, politics, economics, ethics and theology from the University of Melbourne and Oxford University, where he studied as a Rhodes Scholar.
